The time has passed quickly since I last wrote you ages ago. In the meantime I completed my dissertation ("Rivers & Empire: The Madeira Route and the Incorporation of the Brazilian Far West, 1737-1808"), and have received my Ph.D. to become a xx bona fide member of the union of academics.

I hope to be able to see you in the near future. My wife and and will be visiting Brazil this coming August. We will spend most of our time in the Amazon, but I expect to spend a few days in São Paulo, where I hope we will find you. I will drop you another note just before you leave to let you know when we plan to be in são Paulo.

As I think I told you before, I was forced to cut the dissertation into half for the time being. Thus, my thesis only included the geopolitical and ecomomic aspects of the Madeira route. During the next year I hope to write perhaps eight more chapters dealing with: fluvial transport; the kinds of vessels and provisions carried; a study of disease and medicines; a study of the merchants, Indian laborers, slaves, and soldiers in the crews; the scientists who traveled the Madeira and wrote about it (A.R. Ferreira, Lacerda e Almeida, Almeida Serra, et. al.); and a study of the Mura and Mundurucu who kept the Portuguese alert and resisted the encroachments of river convoys and settlement. I naturally am very anxious to talk to you about these subjects, and hopefully, to see your new edition of Monções, which I assume is now completed or near completion.

I hope that all is going well for you and your family. I suppose you have noticed that the United States is beginning mto have political problems similar to those that have been traditionally considered only "Latin American." I hope we can talk at length about these matters.
